

Campaign Medals







The evolution of medals struck to commemorate, and later to reward participants in, a battle or campaigns was a very gradual process. The first medal awarded to all ranks of the Army was the Waterloo Medal, issued in 1816 shortly after the battle which brought the Napoleonic Wars to an end. Following the commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1 and the vast number of digital records online has gone a long way to encourage more and more people to find out about their ancestor's military service.

There are several medals associated with The Great War, and one of these was the Memorial Plaque (commonly known as the Death Penny). The plaque shows Britannia bestowing a laurel crown over a rectangle tablet bearing the full name of the dead in raised lettering. In front stands the British Lion, with two dolphins in the upper field (representing British sea power), an oak branch lower right and at the bottom is a second cub tearing apart the German eagle. The inscription round the circumference reads HE (SHE) DIED FOR FREEDOM AND HONOVR. A parchment scroll was issued with each plaque giving the deceased's name and unit.

The design of the plague was the result of a national competition that was won by Edward Carter Preston, of Liverpool. His initials appear above the front paw of the lion. The plaques were initial made at the Plaque Factory at Acton, but they could not keep up with the demand and the production was moved in December 1920 to the Royal Arsenal, Woolwich. The Woolwich plaques can be identified by a small circle containing WA on the back and by a number stamped between the tail and a number stamped between the leg and tail of the lion. 



CommemorationOswaldtwistle D Day Concert 6th June 2024

On Thursday 6th June Church and Oswaldtwistle Branch Royal British Legion was supported in fundraising for the Poppy Appeal by East Lancs. Concert Band when a concert at Immanuel Church, Oswaldtwistle to commemorate the 80 year anniversary of the D Day landings in Normandy.

The evening commenced at 6:30pm when the church bells were rung out for International peace as the audience arrived. East Lancs. Concert Band, led by bandmaster Dale Grindrod, alongside Accrington Pipe Band and The Hyndburn Singers treated the audience to an evening of patriotic and stirring musical pieces paying tribute to all who fell during the Normandy landings 1944 or were affected by the conflict of WW2. Accrington & District Sea Cadets read out the International Tribute and provided lanterns as a symbol of hope and peace wherever there is conflict.

Honoured guests included Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Lancashire Mrs Louise Copper, Worshipful Mayor of Hyndburn Cllr Booth and many other civic guests from across East Lancashire.

Over £1,329.00 was raised during the event and this money was donated to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal, money from which is used all year round to support past and current members of our UK Armed Forces Community. Thank you to all who supported the event.

100 years young Alvin Ansell!

I first met Alvin on June 6th at the Oakhill Park Monument for the 80th Anniversary D Day Service. A 99-year-old war hero who played a significant role in the 1944 landings marked D-Day with a concert featuring wartime music.

Alvin Ansell, who is a resident of Braeside Home For The Elderly in Oswaldtwistle, commemorated the day of remembrance with a concert at the home, taking him back to his war days. Alvin, who will turn 100 on July 17th, worked as an office-boy for his first job in a large printing press, Henderson and Spalding in Peckham.

He used to cycle to work through the chaos of the previous night's bombing raid to reach the office by 8.30am. One day he was told to deliver some proofs to Camberwell Town Hall and as he was returning to the office through the back streets, he arrived in the Asylum Road area just in time to meet a lone, low-flying German bomber on its escape route after having just bombed Buckingham Palace.

The plane dropped an oil-filled incendiary bomb which landed in the front garden of a terraced house. He said: "I watched helplessly as the little dwelling began to go up in flames.

"I had to get back to the office on time and I remember feeling surprised when no-one there asked why my face and clothes were all sooty. It was not long after this that I arrived at work one morning to find that the presses and office had received a direct hit in the raid overnight.

"Father decided it was getting too dangerous in London so he moved us out to the comparative safety of Chelmsford in Essex."

He joined the Home Guard battalion and was issued with a khaki uniform and an old Lee Enfield .303 rifle with a clip of five bullets, to be used only in case of invasion, which was at that time considered imminent.

The battalion were trained to man and operate the new anti-aircraft rocket firing installations which were being put up to defend London. Alvin volunteered for the Royal Navy and, at the start of 1943, he completed his training at the famous old stone frigate HMS Ganges near Harwich and then went on a specialist training course in radar. which was at that time a new and secret weapon.

He was directed to HMS Victory at Portsmouth and from there was sent on to become the then Lieutenant Commander Peter Scott's radar operator on his flotilla leading

Alvin remembers the Grey Goose lying in the harbour at Newhaven from where the steam gunboats operated, attacking German coastal convoys off the coast of Occupied France.

He continued: "We had several aggressive encounters with the German convoys and their well-armed escorts and our crews began to feel that it would not be long before something really nasty occurred.

"This event duly arrived on a balmy night in late September and we on Grey Goose were extremely lucky to get home again. When the time came for the invasion of Europe we were allocated to the United States sector and helped protect the Normandy bridgehead from D-Day onwards.

"This gave me a good view of the colossal battle to get ashore, especially at Omaha Beach. An abiding memory from that time is of the bodies of dead soldiers rolling in the Channel swell, surprisingly accompanied by a huge drift of little sachets of Nescafe floating among them."

After a couple of brushes with the gallant German E-Boat squadron, still operating against overwhelming odds from their base in Cherbourg, they were so badly damaged in the Great Storm that they had to leave the beachhead invasion.

On their journey back to Southampton in mountainous seas, they had the misfortune to have one of their gunners washed overboard. Despite searching for an hour or more he was never seen again.

At Southampton they were sent on leave and paid off.

Alvin then was drafted to the Mediterranean to become radar operator on a brand new Motor Torpedo Boat which had just arrived in Malta from the United States on a liberty ship.

Alvin said: "This superb little British-designed craft also provided me with the very latest type of radar set and its efficiency and accuracy gave us a great advantage over the German convoy defence vessels as we attacked at night and sank them off the Yugoslav coast and the Istrian Peninsular.

"Although still dangerous, this was a much more comfortable sort of war than that which I had left in the English Channel. I was, in a way, sad when it ended in May 1945 with the surrender of all German forces in Europe.

"Before I was sent home for demobilisation I had to endure an unpleasant and boring month or two on a Fleet minesweeper, ploughing up and down off the North African coast clearing up some of the dangerous areas we and the Germans and Italians had left behind."

When the war ended Alvin became a farm labourer on an Agricultural farm he later married and has a daughter Stephanie & 2 Grandchildren.

In Retirement Alvin came to Lancashire to visit his Brother Colin where a meal had been arranged where he met Joan, love blossomed and he later married for the 2nd time and gained 4 step children Lesley, Maureen, Sandra and John.

Alvin loved to sing in the choir at St Paul's Church, Accrington and also sang with the Hyndburn Singers and the Conchord singers and loved visiting the Civic Theatre and other concert halls.

- Alvin settled down in Braeside Home for the Elderly in Oswaldtwistle in 2022 and now enjoys relaxing writing and reading.
- July 17th Alvin celebrates his 100 years Birthday if anyone wants to send him a card to the home.

ELMFIELD HALL & GATTY PARK

100 years Past to Present

Gattys Gift

In September 1919 Victor Herbert Gatty, a textile dyeing industrialist based near Preston, wrote to Church Urban District Council on the occasion of the centenary of his late father's birth. He made an offer of his former family home, Elmfield Hall, Hyndburn Road, Church and its extensive grounds as a gift to the community along with £500 for its upkeep. This, he and his family hoped, would be of 'permanent benefit to the township'.

On 26th June 1920 Gatty Memorial Park and Elmfield Hall Museum and Reading Room opened to the public. The Accrington Observer described the celebrations as 'A Great Day for Church' with processions along the surrounding streets, displays of 'girl Morris dancers in pink and yellow', the local Fire Brigade on parade and speeches from local dignitaries.

The museum featured diverse objects from Frederick Albert Gatty's own collections including textile prints from his and other local textile business archives, taxidermy, fossils and family photographs.

A century later a community project, Gatty's Gift: A Centenary of Colour and Community, based at Elmfield Hall and now home to Community Solutions North West was supported with funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund through the generosity of National Lottery players. Project volunteers took part in online sessions between June 2020 and April 2021. As part of this process, they engaged in a programme of skills-based learning in research, oral history interviewing and recording and exhibition interpretation and design. They also co-curated an exhibition at the Haworth Art Gallery, which due to Covid-19 restrictions was initially shown online.



Accrington's Ambulance Service - part 2

by Ellison Street

During 1933 it was resolved that ambulance stock held should be transferred from the Tramway's accounts to the Omnibus Department's account, to be shown as an asset without liability, including the Motor Ambulance at £8/5s/0p. In February a communication was received from the local St. John Ambulance Association, thanking the Council for concessions granted for using the ambulance, but stating they were no longer able to meet any increased charges for people resident outside the Borough. They gave notice to the Council that their agreement would be terminated on February 28th. It was resolved that having received notice of this termination they would approach the Watch, Public Lighting and Fire Brigade Committees, to ascertain whether they would consider taking over the ambulance service at a convenient date. In May the Town Clerk submitted correspondence to the Council from Rishton UDC asking if the Watch Committee would be willing to enter an agreement for use of the ambulance when required. In July it was resolved the Corporation would enter into an agreement for use of the ambulance when it was available, at a charge of 7s/6p per journey between Accrington and Rishton, or from Accrington to Blackburn with a return to Rishton. They also considered an application from Accrington & District Workpeople's Fund on this issue, together with a report from the Chief Constable on the subject of providing ambulance services. It was ultimately resolved that before going any further, the Borough Treasurer, the GM and the Chief Constable should prepare a financial statement of the costs of running the service during the past year, whilst taking into account the possibility of having additional ambulances in the

At a meeting of the Watch Committee in November, the Town Clerk produced a letter from the Ministry of Health, deploring the exchanging of patients between ambulances at the Borough's boundaries due to a lack of reciprocal arrangements between neighbouring authorities, instead of one ambulance carrying patients on a through journey to and from any hospital. He replied, "That this practice was not in operation in Accrington and they already had agreements with neighbouring authorities that worked quite satisfactorily". The Chief Constable reported in his opinion, a new ambulance was required and he was authorised to obtain quotations from manufacturers for presenting to future meetings, so that the costs might be included in estimates for the coming year. In December he reported in accordance with instructions, he had now obtained quotations for the supply of a new ambulance for inclusion in the budget for 1934/35.

Incomes from the ambulance service were in 1920/21 £278, 1921/22, £239, 1922/23 £179, 1923/24, £166. But losses were in 1927/28 -£8, 1928/29 -£30. 1929/30 -£34, 1930/31 -£55, 1931/32 -£51

The Watch Committee met In January 1934 to examine tenders for the supply of this new vehicle. A Sub-Committee inspected a number of vehicles, before the Chairman and Vice-Chair made the final choice by resolving to purchase a Du Cros. The GM reported that as a consequence of relocating the ambulance to the Fire Station on Saturday May 19th, it would be necessary to consider the position of its driver. After the Chief Constable voiced his views it was resolved that driver Williams would be released from the Transport Department, with a view to being re-employed in this capacity at the Fire Station at a wage of 3 guineas per week. This coincided with the

transferring of the vehicle.

Due to the War in July 1939 the GM was preparing plans for two single deck buses to be adapted as 'emergency ambulances', at a cost of approximately £10 each. If approved this change of use could be effected within two hours. It was resolved to accept his suggestion and resolved that these could be incorporated into one of the Civil Defence Committee's schemes. However only one, an all-Leyland LT1 with 32-seat body (number 63 registered TF 1508), was re-configured to give greater accessibility to stretchers only to be used as an 'auxiliary' ambulance in the event of sudden emergencies.

The Town Clerk reported in November 1944 the old Austin Ambulance, which had been on loan to the Civil Defence Service, was now at the bus garage for a mechanical examination. In this connection the GM reported that it was no longer suitable for further use in this capacity, suggesting that it might be put to good use as a 'staff' vehicle. It was resolved the Committee were prepared to offer the sum of £30 to purchase this vehicle. By October 1948 this and a 'considerable amount of ancillary equipment' was available for disposal at the bus garage, as this service had now passed into the hands of the newly established National Health Service.



The bus selected for use as an auxiliary ambulance on normal service (C. Carter,

The design of the play area was heavily influenced by feedback from local residents and schools. This collaborative effort ensured the final design met the diverse needs and expectations of the community.

The new play area boasts 12 pieces of play equipment, catering to children of various ages and abilities. Key features include a trampoline for high-energy fun; extra swings to accommodate children with different abilities; three slides designed for various age groups; a wheelchair accessible roundabout and an aerial runway, offering an exciting experience for older children.

The project was made possible through generous funding and support from multiple sources. The Lancashire Environment Fund awarded £40,000 to the Clayton and Altham Prospects Panel. In addition, the Council invested a further £125,000 to ensure the community's aspirations for a new, modern play area were fully realised.

Paul Worswick from the Clayton and Altham Prospects Panel expressed his enthusiasm for the project, stating, "The new play area will be a great addition to Mercer Park, ensuring it continues to meet local people's expectations as an awardwinning park. We hope that it will become a cherished destination for families, promoting physical activity, social interaction, and community cohesion."

Councillor Kimberley Whitehead, Portfolio Holder for Culture, Heritage, Parks & Open Spaces said, "The Council is grateful to all those who contributed to the successful completion of this project. We are proud of the parks and green spaces we have to offer across the borough and we want residents to continue to use these great facilities.
